This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

#### Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

- Our music curriculum is informed by the <u>model music curriculum</u> (March 2021). At Beckfoot Allerton we use the charanga model music curriculum scheme, recommended by Bradford music hub, as well as our bespoke music curriculum. (see Music overview for further information).
- All teachers receive music CPD with the music lead every cycle, with a focus on improving subject knowledge and music pedagogy.
- Children are taught music every cycle in music weeks, which means that all children have twelve hours of music every cycle (3 times per year).
- Our music curriculum has been designed to ensure that children's knowledge and skills in music progress every year. Music theory lessons are a key part of the music week teach children musical vocabulary and definitions and skills. For example, Key stage one are taught key vocabulary such as pitch, rhythm and tempo. This knowledge deepens further over the years so that children can eventually read, compose and write music on the treble and bass clef by year 6.
- In each music week, children will learn to sing and play instruments such as the glockenspiel and djembe. They will have a key song that they will study, sing and play on their instrument.
- As well as their music weeks, each year group will receive six additional music hours with a music specialist, Mr Morrison. In these sessions, children will listen and respond to a chosen song, learn to read and play the song and then compose a new song in the final sessions.
- All children attend a singing assembly every Thursday with our music specialist teacher. In these assemblies, musical vocabulary is consolidated.
- In addition to weekly singing assemblies, all children in Y1 to Y6 receive a half hour singing assembly, led by the music lead, in the last few weeks of each cycle. These sessions focus on improving singing ability, such as using the diaphragm for support, correct breathing, vocal warm ups and legato and staccato notes.

## Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

- Children in Year 5 and 6 have the opportunity to attend the school choir. This takes place on Thursday afternoons and is led by the music lead. There are opportunities for children in the choir to perform, for example during the school concerts and to perform for the community.
- There are also plans for children in Year 3 and Year 4 to receive additional singing this year.
- We do not currently offer private instrumental or vocal lessons and we are considering how this can be implemented effectively.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Children perform in musical events throughout the year. Every year KS1 learn and perform the nativity in December, while children in KS2 perform vocal and instrumental pieces in their winter concert.
- Every class also has the opportunity to perform what they have learnt in music lessons to the whole school every cycle in singing assemblies.
- The choir have opportunities to perform for the community though out the year, such as the local retirement home.
- Our musical specialist, Mr Morrison, plans opportunities for all year groups to sing or perform at local events.
- We have live performances in school e.g plumber drummer

## In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- As we are currently not able to offer private or small group instrumental lessons, this is something we are exploring and would like to implement over the next few years.
- We also aim to provide a wider range of musical instruments in music lessons over the next few years.
- We are exploring how we can offer more musical visits to our children, especially trips to professional, live performances.
- We aim to improve our use of technology when teaching music, such as use of recording, sound and mixing equipment.
- We aim to promote the work of our sister secondary schools to showcase their musicians to our children
